Talks on pay are settled

A pay deal of 9.2 per cent has now been agreed for all electricity supply industry staff.

After a ballot, NJIC employees were first to accept the offer and other staff groups then followed suit.

The pay settlements contain a number of other elements, including joint statements of intent recognising the impact of privatisation and the need for meaningful discussions to take place between managers, staff and their representatives about changes in the use of staff that will be necessary in the

short and long term.

Manweb's Personnel
Manager Mike Metcalfe said: "The settlements have recognised that we are moving into privatisation and management will now initiate discussions with staff and their representatives. Any resulting improvements in productivity and efficiency will operate to the long-term advantage of Manweb, the staff and our customers.

Sales soar in our last year in public sector

WE'RE IN GREAT IN its last full financial year in the public sector, SHAPE Manweb achieved the targets set by the

£26.6 million during 1988/89. The good news was announced by Chairman Bryan Weston who, presenting the Annual Report and Accounts, FOR THE said: "The results are pleasing at a time when Manweb and its staff are going through considerable re-organisation in preparation for privatisation.

"Despite a mild winter we had a growth in electricity sales of 2.5 per cent, with all sectors contributing to the increase. This was due to competitive marketing of electricity. It also confirms the trend of economic growth in our region.

Hectic

"In a hectic year we have continued to introduce measures to improve customer service. Our Customer Charter sets out the standards of service customers can expect from us and should we fail in seven specific areas in which we have a

monopoly, we impose a penalty on ourselves and send the customer a £10 voucher. During the year, 97,173 jobs were completed and we sent out 173 vouch-

Mr. Weston said Manweb had a caring policy towards customers who experience difficulty paying their bills, by extending credit and easy payment meth-

The number of customers disconnected for non-payment of electricity bills fell by 37.7 per cent over the year to 2,924. At the same time, 32,620 card meters were installed, as an alternative to the burglar-prone coin

A staggering £5 million was saved by preventing theft of electreity through the continuing programme to install polycarbonate meter covers. A total of 22,395 were fitted during the year, making 60,306 in all.

Mr. Weston added: "In 1988/89 we spent £28.3 million on extending the network to supply new homes and businesses. We also spent a further £14 million as part of our on-going refurbishment programme to improve the reliability and security of service well into the next century.

"In a year when the environment featured prominently, we have demonstrated our concern by being one of the first organisations to change our commercial fleet to unleaded petrol.

We are continuing to examine our operations to see where we can make positive contributions to the environment.

Entitled "The Power of Wales", this multi - faceted presentation in Amgueddfa'r Gogledd - the Museum of the North - in Llanberis first of all traces the history of Wales from prehistoric times through to the present day.

This is followed by the National Grid's focus on electricity. In a new auditorium capable of seating 50, people are given a vivid 15-minute presentation by Merlin and a lady employee of the National Grid Company who reveals the wonders of modern electricity and its uses.

A visit to the pumped storage station at Dinorwig is also possible, subject to the day-to-day operational requirments of the station. The Power of Wales exhibition is expected to attract up to 300,000 visitors by 1993.

Until now, the museum has only been open for four months of the year, between May and September, but this is to change. From now until September 15 the museum will be open seven days a week from 0930 to 1800, and from 1000 to 1700 from September 16 to the end of october, after which opening times will be reviewed.

Booster for Eisteddfod

Almost every one of the 150,000 visitors to this years National Eisteddfod at Llanrwst, North Wales, would have been aware of Manweb's sponsorship at the event.


As part of the week's youth entertainment, Manweb also supported an evening concert by the National Youth Orchestra of Wales, to which major local customers were invited as guests of Chairman Bryan Weston.

Just decades after they were built, Britain's tower blocks are rotten with damp. But pioneering work in Liverpool by architect Sydney Bolland and Development Engineer, Roger Critch, has found that with the correct heating and installation tower blocks can be saved.

Faulty towers get a facelift

The three tower blocks which make up Knowsley Heights in Huyton, Liverpool are typical of 1960s high rise developments. Conceived as communities in the sky, by the 1980s they were damp, expensive to heat and difficult to let. Independent Liverpool architect, Sydney Bolland was convinced that there was a way to turn dilapidated high rises into desirable, economic housing, and his experience told him that many of the problems could be traced to a failure to heat the buildings properly.

Three years of Manweb funded research led Bolland to conclude that there was a direct link between under utilisation of energy and building deterioration.

"A cold, poorly ventilated building is a disaster," said Bolland. "If the heating is turned off condensation builds up in the concrete, changing the chemical nature of the material. Buildings actually rot from the inside."

Impressed by Bolland's findings, Knowsley Borough Council obtained fundings for a £900,000 plus refurbishment of Block One, Knowsley Heights, the cash coming from a £400,000 Department of the Environment Urban Aid grant and £515,000 in additional borrowing capacity for Knowsley Borough Council.

The main cause of dampness was not water penetrating the structure from outside, but condensation within the flats being

able to escape. Cold, moisture ladened, was soaking into the building's concrete walls.

"We'd drill a hole into a wall and by the next day it had filled up with gunge caused by the water in the concrete," said Bolland.

"As well as dealing with condensation, we had to find a heating system people could afford to run, "added Manweb Development Engineer Roger Critch.

Bolland used hi-tech computer models to established that tenants needed to spend £18 per week to heat flats sufficiently to prevent dampness problems. But on average they were spending a total of just £5.70 per flat on energy. This included lighting and television, as well as heat.

When this was broken down into what tenants could actually afford for heating, it became apparent that weekly bills needed to come down to around £2 per flat.

By using storage heaters and a custom-built heat exchanging ventilation system manweb hopes to achieve the necessary saving.

"There was no point in giving people heating they couldn't afford," said Critch. "With this system tenants aren't frightened by the cost."

The main part if the heating will be under the landlord's control, with costs being included in the rent. Tenants will be able to adjust heating to some degree, and direct acting heaters can provide 'top up' warmth as required.

Efficient

By looking at tenants' lifestyles, it was possible to tailor the refurbishments to suit them. For example, it was found that few tenants used expensive automatic washing machines. Washing was soaked overnight followed by a quick run through the machine.

"It's a very efficient way of getting washing done, but it meant each tenant had one and a quarter square metres of pond in their flat, adding to the condensation problems," said Bolland.

The new ventilation system deals with this, allowing the kitchen and bathroom to double up as efficient laundry drying rooms.

Ridding the building of moisture already trapped in the concrete meant removing an earlier 'solution' to the dampness problem.

"Five years ago the Council put a weatherproof layer of latex and bitumen paint on the building,' said Critch. "It looks fine, on the outside, but as well as keeping rainwater out it trapped water already within the concrete."

The weatherproof paint is now

being removed, allowing the building to 'breathe'.

The whole structure is being wrapped in a mineral wool 'overcoat' which keeps the building warm yet allows moisture to escape.

Over this will go a rainproof cladding, separated from the wool by a cavity through which air can reach the building.

In addition to providing protection against the elements, the cladding is grafitti resistant, the building's appearance further enhanced by new UPVC framed double glazing, which has the added bonus of reducing heat loss.

The improvements are proving popular with tenants, who have remained in residence throughout the refurbishments.

"We haven't had one complaint, in spite of the inevitable noise and drilling," said Knowsley Borough Council District Housing Manager, Steve Gow.

Upgraded

Tenants have been involved in the project through meetings, and the completed block will feature a room for communal use on the ground floor.

Security too is being upgraded, with an on site concierge, security fencing and an entry phone system.


"With Knowsley Heights we're setting standards for the future,"said Critch. "The flats' energy efficiency will make the block a very environmentally friendly 'green' building."

Environment Minister, David Tripper - then Parliamentary Under Secretary of State at the Department of the Environment - praised the scheme when funding was approved last year, and with work due for completion in November, much attention will be focused on the block's energy conservation measures.

The Building Research Establishment Energy Conservation Support Unit is interested in the pioneering scheme, and other local authorities, with their own high-rise problems, are keen to see how Knowsley Heights fares.





London conference breaks with tradition

ON August 3, just eight days after the Electricity Bill received Royal Assent and passed into law, the 12 Chairmen of the area electricity boards, including Manweb Chairman Bryan Weston, gathered in London to present their annual results to the financial and business community.

That same day, Deputy Chairman and Managing Director-designate of the privatised Manweb, Richard Gales, together with Director, Power Marketing, Colin Leonard, were making similar announcements to the local and regional media at press conferences in Liverpool and Chester.

The London event was a unique occasion in the electricity industry's history and marked a very real transition from four decades of state owner-

Traditionally, there has always been an August presentation of the performance of the entire electricity industry, involving the CEGB, the area boards and the Electricity Council.

But this time neither the CEGB nor the Electricity Council were involved. This conference was about the 12 businesses which serve the nation's 22 million electricity customers.

The conference attracted an international audience and drew largely positive responses from the City observers and analysts. The national media, while naturally focusing some attention on what they see as the controversy of privatisation, generally accepted the success of the business.

The venue was the Park Lane Hotel in Piccadilly and is typical of the London Hotels chosen for such events - a faded opulence that needs to be dressed to suit the modern world. As ever, the staging necessary to give 12 chairman an opportunity to talk to analysts and media drew comparison with Blankety Blank in some uncharitable media quarters.

Two events were held - a breakfast time presentation to the City analysts, whose reports will be important to investment managers and individuals over the coming months, and a similar pre-lunch presentation to the financial, city and energy journalists from national television, radio and news

The message was very clear, and accepted by key observers: the 12 electricity businesses are profitable, efficient and caring.

The Chairmen had chosen four of their number to present the aggregate results of the Boards, but all took part in the open forum.

Ouestions covered almost every aspect of the businesses but inevitably concentrated on prices, power contracts and nuclear issues, and, of course, privatisation.

After a question session the Chairmen were besieged by journalists for interviews and several went in front of the cameras to talk to ITN, BBC, Channel 4 and Thames TV.

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



microwave cookers, and as demand increases, more are being introduced onto the market. Ten per cent of microwaves purchased are now of the dual energy type and many are sold to second-time buyers.

The combination models offer several benefits. They can be used for at least three functions - as a microwave, as a conventional cooker, or as a dual energy cooker which combines the speed of a microwave with a fan oven to cook food at a fraction of the time, while retaining the flavour and texture of the food, as if it has been cooked in an ordinary fan oven.

Some combination cookers have other facilities, in addition to the three operational options, such as a grill element situated in the top of the cooking cavity. This can be used as a conventional

A turntable is fitted to most combination cookers. Included is a facility for turning it off, enabling extra cooking space for large

Some models include an automatic sensing device which eliminates the need for the user to calculate thawing and cooking times. The infra-red sensor works out the initial surface temperature of the food and is programmed to give the appropriate time required for the food.

The humidity sensor reacts to the steam emitted from the food and is programmed to give the appropriate cooking time, while the weight sensor under the turntable or floor of the microwave is programmed to allow for a specific cooking time according to the weight and type of food.

Some models incorporate a pre-set feature on the oven for up to 24 hours. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions regarding the types of containers that can be used in the oven.

MARINATED BEEF FILLET

(serves four)

1Kg (2lb) fillet of beef; salt and freshly ground black pepper; 1 clove garlic, sliced; 1 red onion, sliced; 45ml (3tbsp) olive oil; 30ml (2tbsp) red wine vinegar; 150ml (1/4 pint) red wine; 60ml (4tbsp) freshly chopped parsley; 60ml (4tbsp) freshly chopped chives; 2 fresh bay leaves.

For the sauce: 50gm (20z) butter; 1 small red onion, chopped; 100gm (40z) button mushroom, sliced; 75ml (5tbsp) red wine; 15gm(1/20z) plain flour.

Trim the beef fillet of any excess fat, tie into a neat shape (you can ask the butcher to do this for you), and place in a sealable container. Generously season with salt and freshly ground pepper. Make several incisions in the meat and push in sliced garlic, and scatter the onions over the meat.

Pour oil and vinegar into a screw jar, shake vigorously to mix and pour over beef fillet with the red wine. Add 15ml (1tbsp) of parsley, chives and bay leaves. Cover and leave in fridge overnight to marinate. Place beef in a roasting dish with 60ml (4tbsp) marinade, and cook on combination 200C medium for approximately 18 minutes until meat is just cooked (still looking pink). Turn the meat over half-way through cooking, and if you

minutes. Leave to stand for five minutes. To make the sauce, melt 25gm (1oz) butter on high for 30 seconds. Add chopped red onion and cook for two minutes until softened. Add mushrooms and cook for two minutes. Pour over marinade and add remaining wine. Cook on high for three minutes to bring to the boil.

prefer your meat well-done, increase cooking time by four

Mix together flour and remaining butter in a bowl, and gradually add small knobs of the mixture to the sauce, whisking continuously. Cook on high for two minutes, stirring occasionally, until thickened and clear. Remove string from meat and roll in remaining herbs. Slice and serve with sauce.

CARROT AND WALNUT GATEAU

(serves four)

200gm (80z) butter; 200gm (80z) soft light brown sugar; 1.25ml (1/4 tsp) ground cinnamon; 1.25ml (1/4 tsp) nutmeg; 4 eggs, separated; juice of half an orange; 150gm (6oz) self raising flour; 5ml (1tsp) baking powder; 50gm (2oz) ground almonds; 175gm (7oz) walnuts, chopped; 300gm (12oz) carrots, grated; 200gm (80z) full fat cheese; rind of one orange; 5ml (1tsp) clear honey; 2 oranges, segmented to decorate; 25gm (1oz) walnut halves.

Grease and line a 20cm (8in) round cake dish. Place butter, sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg together in a bowl. Cream together until mixture is light and fluffy. Gradually beat in egg yolks, fold in orange juice along with flour, baking powder, ground almonds and 100gm (4oz) walnuts.

Whisk egg whites and fold into mixture with grated carrots. Cook on combination 250C medium for 20 to 25 minutes, cool then slice into three pieces.

Beat together soft cheese, orange rind and honey with juice from segmented oranges. Sandwich gateau together with half the cream chees and orange segments. Spread another third of the mixture around the edges.

Place the remaining chopped walnuts on greaseproof paper and roll the sides of the cake in the nuts to completely cover. Spead the remaining mixture over the top of the cake, decorate with walnut halves and orange rind. The unfilled cake can be frozen for up to one month.

A first class service

The Post Office has sold over £5 million worth of Manweb electricity metre cards since the system was launched in March 1988, which is good for Manweb and valuable business for the Post Office.

But like many initiatives, the scheme has not been without problems. To see how things could be improved, Manweb's Cash Income section organised two seminars for the Post Office Staff at Manweb's Head Office.

"The message we were getting from our people was that the vouchers weren't being completed properly," said Executive Officer, Cash Income, Martyn Jones.

The vouchers, filled in by Post Office counter staff, provide the 'vital account link' between the customer, buying a payment card, and Manweb's Cash Income staff, who update the account records at Head Office.

When buying cards, customers should present a Payment Card, carrying their account details. But customers sometimes lose or forget cards, so it's vital counter staff obtain the right information and set it down correctly.

There are five main problem areas: missing lead-in zeros in number boxes, datestamp (which also identify the Post Office) incomplete account details and addresses, legibility, and failure to despatch vouchers daily.

Most of the two million card transactions handled by the Post Office to March 1989 were trouble free, but like Manweb, the Post Office were keen to improve the service.

"We had Post Office staff from across the area, and received some useful feedback from them," said Martyn. "It's really a two-way exchange of information.'

Further seminars are planned, and with a projected 100,000 customers by March 1990 the meter card business looks set to


Non-technical
