Underground work firms on Wrexham Industrial Estate from power dips caused by birds flying into overhead power lines. Overhead lines on Bryn Estyn

Lane, which runs down on to the Industrial Estate, are being taken down and the cables are being undergrounded to prevent damage from seagulls and other birds.

The winged marauders have been flying in from filter beds on a nearby sewage farm and colliding with the lines, causing the protection system to be activated. As a result a number of companies on the industrial estate have been experiencing dips in their supply which has caused their machinery to stop.

The remedial action by PowerSystems is being taken because the problem, ongoing for a number of years, has suddenly increased over the past year.

"Birds have been flying in to

the 33 kv lines and activating the protection," said Network **Operations Section Head Gary** Evans.

"The dip has been affecting units on the Industrial Estate where sensitive equipment has been dropping off.

"The effects have been felt by our high-voltage customers on the Rhosesni to Marchwiel circuit. To prevent a recurrence we are undergrounding all the lines and expect the project to be completed by the end of March."






