EDITORIAL

Backing MANWEB!

IT IS an almost universal phenomenon among gregarious species—animal or human—that they tend to squabble among themselves over trivialities until faced with a common threat from an outside agency.

Immediately the situation is transformed. Ranks are quickly closed, fratricidal dissensions forgotten, until the alien threat is repulsed.

The most striking examples of this kind of behaviour among human beings have always manifested themselves in times of war. With "the Hun at the gate"—either literally or metaphorically, party squabbles are put into cold storage and Governments of coalition or national unity take the helm.

So it was in Britain in 1914 and 1940. The enemy was easily identified. The danger was clearly apparent to all. Europe's classic example was, perhaps, Yugoslavia, where the presence of the universal oppressor succeeded in uniting peoples who had been at each other's throat for generations.

Today the Hun may not be at the gate in the accepted sense, but our national leaders leave us in no doubt that the wolf is at the door —or at least, well on his way up the garden path.

Our problem

Others may be deciding to "Back Britain", by working extra hours, increasing production, cutting prices, and so on.

Those who work in electricity supply may find it a little difficult to work out extra ways of joining the fight. Units of electricity do not come from a production line in the same obvious way as motor-cars. Working as we do to the smallest possible surplus margins in the financial sphere, we are in no position to cut prices.

Our industry does, however, have a key role to play. In the economic battle for survival and prosperity, industry, homes, shops, offices and farms are utterly dependent on a reliable electricity supply, and prompt and willing sales and service.

These are the weapons which we can place at the disposal of Britain. By "backing MANWEB" to the hilt in all matters, we are Backing Britain in the most essential way.

Staff Conferences at Warrington

JUST one hundred and one people turned up at the Masonic Hall in Warrington a few weeks ago to enjoy a dinner and hear some interesting talks at the District's Annual Open Meeting.

Mr. R. G. Monk (District Commercial Engineer) as Chairman of the No. 7 Local Advisory Committee welcomed everyone to the Meeting recognising the presence of a number of senior officers from Head Office and Area 2/3 Office before introducing the guest speaker for the evening, Lt. Col. R. E. Rowbottom, M.B.E., Chief Constable of Warrington County Borough Police. The Chairman then made apologies for the absence of the other guest speaker, Mr. J. L. W. Ladner (Education and Training Officer) who was indisposed.

Following an excellent dinner, Mr. Monk reported on the work of the L.A.C. during the year. Then Mr. J. W. Trimble (Manager, Area 2/3) spoke on the achievements of the Board during the same period and making full use of the popular version of the Board's Annual Report summary, he brought out a number of interesting facts and figures. In one instance he showed that during the last ten years, the price of electricity had risen only half as fast as other goods and products throughout the country.

He also pointed out that the electricity industry paid out £33 million in rates. Locally, MANWEB had paid £1 million and the C.E.G.B. in this area had paid out another million pounds. This worked out at about £2 for every MANWEB customer.

Mr. Trimble concluded by saying that last year the picture may have appeared rather gloomy, but he urged everyone not to be pessimistic—that the future was electric. He said that to paint a brighter picture we should first improve productivity and keep down the costs. "We have plenty of energy to sell, so we should go all out to sell it . . . sell energy, sell appliances, sell contracting."

Then Lt. Col. Rowbottom came forward to present Safe Driving Awards to members of the District staff. He said that to do this gave him very great pleasure as he appreciated that the men concerned were making some contribution to safety on the roads. He went on to quote some of the figures of people killed and injured on the roads, "many of these roads being made in the horse and buggy days".

However, it was the man behind the wheel, the irresponsible driver, the man in a hurry, who caused most accidents, he said.

The Chief Constable went on to say that some people regarded the use of the breathalyser as not playing the game, but as far as the police were concerned it was no game when people's lives were concerned. He said that we should all be prepared to lose a little bit of freedom if we could save a few more lives. "I am convinced that the law is right and proper and I am right behind Mrs. Castle on this," he continued.

In Warrington, he informed us, eleven people had been tested with the breathalyser and six of these had proved negative. He said that the police were out to catch the really drunken driver and to make sure that the courts would convict.

It's the driver who counts

In conclusion, Lt. Col. Rowbottom said that no matter how good the road or how good the vehicle, it was the driver who counted, and that the Safe Drivers of MANWEB who had just received their awards helped to prove this point.

A lively and interesting Open Forum session was next on the agenda and a number of questions ranging from the setting up of a pensioners association, to the merging of District Offices were well and truly aired.


