Rover Group chief presents awards

"THE electricity industry's 'PEP' Awards underline the need for British industry to strive constantly for greater efficiency and productivity," declared Graham Day, Chairman of the Rover Group, presenting this year's MANWEB area awards at a ceremony at a Runcorn hotel in September.

Mr. Day, a prominent industrialist of Canadian extraction, welcomed the chance to return to the North West an area for which he has a soft spot, following a period in charge of Cammell Laird of Birkenhead.

British industry was under increasingly competitive pressure, not just Board Chairman Bryan Weston, who from Europe but on a global scale, he

"We have been through a dodgy patch, but there are signs that we turned the corner some time ago. Provided that we continue to hustle, although life won't be easy, there is a solid way forward. As I travel abroad, I find that Britain is becoming more and more respected—and even envied."

MANWEB and industry in general had a common interest, and the 'PEP' Awards were an expression of that, added Mr. Day. Peter Hopkins then called forward the representatives of the winning companies to receive their awards and certificates, and concluded by commenting: "In most competitions, there is only one entrant who can win. In the 'PEP' competition, all the entrants are winners. This year, the total capital investment in the 19 projects entered was £4.3-million. The annual savings are £1.85-million, and the average payback period is 2.3 years.

"All the companies who entered, whether they received an award or not, have already won in the real world of the market-place.'

1987 'PEP' **AWARDS**

A DEESIDE company which manufactures facturers of concrete products; and Mersey Can resin coatings for the linings of cans used in the food and drinks industries and a major Widnes chemicals firm were the winners in their respect-Efficiency and Productivity) Awards in the MANWEB area

Winner in the category for firms with up to 100 employees was Dexter Midlands Coatings, of Deeside, and in that for firms with more than 100 staff was Laporte Industries Ltd., of Widnes. Each received a trophy in the form of the Greek letter "Eta" - the adopted symbol for efficiency -together with a cheque for £1,000 and a commemorative plaque to be displayed in the factory

In each category the achievements of two entrants were judged as "Highly Commended".

In the category for smaller companies, the firms recognised in this way were Pwllheli Brick and Block Ltd., of Pwllheli, Gwynedd, manuand Drum Ltd., of Birkenhead.

The two larger firms whose entries were highly commended were Vactite Ltd., of Bootle, ive categories of this year's 'PEP' (Power for Merseyside, makers of a new product known as "wire-wrap wire", and the Aluminium Corporation Ltd., of Dolgarrog, Gwynedd.

For the first time this year, agricultural users of electricity were eligible to enter the 'PEP' competition, and a "Highly Commended" recognition was awarded to Mr. K. W. Rimmer's Merryfall Farm, at Whitley, Cheshire, for using electricity in grain-drying.

Judges for the MANWEB area competition were Robin Gardner, Regional Energy Efficiency Officer; Donald Doo, Manager of Trawsfynydd Power Station; Tom Booth, Chairman of Refuge Assurance, representing the CBI; and David Sturgeon, Merseyside Area Manager of the Midland Bank. The panel was chaired by Bryan Ogden, MANWEB's Energy Marketing

THE WINNERS

Dexter Midlands Coatings opted for an electric induction kettle, instead of the traditional gas-fired system which has inherent temperature control problems, for production of the water-based resin used in their speciality food and beverage can linings. The company made substantial savings, with the additional benefits of using a pollution-free fuel needing minimal maintenance. This firm is part of the world-wide Dexter Corporation, and the lessons learned at the Deeside plant are being adopted in other parts of the world.

Laporte Industries Ltd. invested £377,000 in the installation of an electric coreless induction furnace at their inorganics plant at Widnes, replacing an oil-fired furnace, for the production of ferrous sulphide. In addition to saving an estimated £57,000 a year in energy costs, this switch has led to improved working conditions for staff, a better endproduction, and a reduction in environmental

Both winners of the MANWEB competition now go forward to the national final, to compete against the winners in other Area Boards.

HIGHLY COMMENDED

Pwllheli Brick and Block Ltd. installed an electrode boiler to produce steam heating for drying their concrete blocks, replacing an oil-fired system. A modest investment of £9,500 has led to savings of £2,200 a year, due to the more efficient performance of the drying kilns, a better quality product, increased production and an end to weekend working

Mersey Can and Drums Ltd. invested £75,000 in electronic welding machines, making it possible for them to enter the market for large-capacity drums and cutting their "sideseaming' costs by half. Savings are estimated at £18,000 a year; production is greatly increased; and the new cleaner environment is popular with the work-force.

Vactite Ltd. makes a "wire-wrap wire" used in the connections of printed circuit boards, and product quality is crucial. Environmental contamination was resulting in an unacceptable "reject" rate dropping from 50 per cent to a mere five per cent.

The Aluminium Corporation Ltd. invested a total of £83,000 in an electric induction furnace to replace an oil-fired furnace for melting down scrap and swarf metal which has been recovered from machining operations. This was previously an unpleasant task for the work-force and involved substantial metal losses, but the advantages of the electric furnace are leading to savings estimated at more than £100,000 a year-and a much happier work-force.

At Merryfall Farm, the addition of an electric dry-air generator to the existing bank of electric heaters used to dry the farm crop of 400 tons of wheat and barley led to dramatic improvements. Now, regardless of weather conditions, grain can be dried for 24 hours a day if necessary, taking advantage of cheap night-rate electricity, and there have been big improvements in grain quality. The investment of £8,500 has been rewarded with savings of up to £6 per tonne of grain, and it is estimated that the new generator will pay for itself in just over three years.





Cricketers win League


SUCCESS has come to the MANWEB Head Office—they have won the Chester and District Mid-Week League, Division 3.
